Being pulled up on a rope to the top of the mast was filmed jumping down from the mast then projecting that shoot backwards in the final print.

The view of the ships from a distance were all small ship models.

Sliding down the sails using just a knife was filmed with the sails not vertical, but on a slope using airplane propellers behind the sail generating enough wind to provide support. The rip in the sail was precut and the knife descent had Fairbank's motion controlled by his being attached to wires and pulleys providing the constant downward speed.

Douglas Fairbanks was married to Mary Pickford who would not allow Doug to kiss any other woman. In the

About the Silent Film "The Black Pirate"

The Black Pirate silent film was premiered in NYC in March 1926.

"Douglas Fairbanks plays a vengeful nobleman who disguises himself as a pirate in order to take down bad guys and save a princess. It's Swashbuckling 101 stuff but Fairbanks has a secret weapon: Technicolor!"

A fan of pirates since his youth, Fairbanks, himself, wrote the story for the film under the name of Elton Thomas. It has all things pirate: Peg legs, parrots on shoulder, pirate bandanas, cutlasses, pistols, duels, walking the plank, wooden ships, iron men and a princess to rescue however, Fairbanks is quoted as saying "I simply can't have pirates without color!"

Technicolor was in its development stages and very expensive so it had been used for a few short films, single scenes in black and white major films, and just two complete major films prior to *The Black Pirate*.

The two color process used a camera that created two images on the same strip of film. One image beamed through a green filter and the other through a red filter. The master print was processed into two half-thickness separate prints that were then glued together to produce the final result. For interior and exterior filming, Technicolor required two different sets of costumes and makeup due to the difference in the light sources.

Three cameras were used simultaneously, all hand cranked: 1) Technicolor, 2) Black and White in case the Technicolor was a disaster, and 3) for an export print.

Fairbanks did all his own stunts. The entire movie was shot in nine weeks. Of course, there were no computer graphics or green screen shots, but there were some early photographic tricks that were used. Want to know more?

After the show you are invited to come on stage to meet the artist, inspect the organ console, and ask questions.

About the Strony Digital Theatre & Classical Organ

Instead of pipes, the digital STR-4 organ uses ranks of pipe samples which are digital recordings of actual pipe sounds. (A rank is a set of pipes that all play the same type of sound .. like flute, diapason, tibia, etc.) The Strony instrument has 32 theatre ranks and 49 classical ranks. A switch determines if the colored stop tabs on the console control the theatre or classical sounds.

The organ's pipe and other sounds play through 20 speaker cabinets distributed among three chambers housing a total of 36 speakers and 8 passive radiators.
